Most of you know that I love the sport and history of baseball. It's been a part of my life since I was a child and a subject that I have studied and that I teach. So I'd like to share a quote from a famous baseball player that is relevant to all of us in this moment. The quote is from **Jackie Robinson** who, in 1947 as you may know, became the first African American baseball player in the major leagues. That same year he was named Rookie of the Year, two years later he was named the National League MVP, and in 1955 was a World Series champion. This athlete was so accomplished and had achieved so much that you might find his quote surprising. Here's what he said:

The measure of a life is not what that life accomplishes but rather the impact that life has on others.

Lutheran since the University's very beginnings in 1961. Our very first scholarship, marking 55 years, is the **Bell Medical Fellowship Fund,** initiated by former Cal Lutheran biology professor, Dr. A.

Weir Bell, to support a Cal Lutheran graduate during the first year of medical school. Although Dr. Bell passed away only two years after establishing this fund, his generosity and foresight have made a tremendous difference to many Cal Lutheran graduates over the years and will continue to for many years to come. Much gratitude to Dr. Bell's widow, Josephine, who kindly maintained the scholarship.

Since that first endowed scholarship there have been many, many more created. In your program you will see 51 funds currently marking significant anniversaries from 50 years to five years. We are humbled by the generosity of these contributors and honor each of you for your commitment to the University.

The Willis Family Scholarship in History, endowed by Richard and Karen Willis; the Jennifer and Craig Zobelein Endowed Scholarship, endowed by Jennifer and Craig Zobelein who are both Cal Lutheran alumni; and the Pastor Carl O. and Edith W. Nelson Endowed Scholarship, established by the Rev. Carl Nelson in honor of his parents. The Zobelein family is here today. Please stand and be recognized.
