JDC shares The Associated's Global Responsibility Committee's commitment to strengthening Jewish communities globally. This is why it is a priority for JDC to support the Evelyn Peters Jewish Community Center (EPJCC), the heart of the Jewish community in Mumbai since its launch in 1999. In a city of 18 million residents, the 10th most populated city in the world, 85 percent of India's 4,400 Jews live in Mumbai and its surrounding area. Jews of India are such a tiny minority among a diverse population of millions. Thus, organized Jewish social, religious, cultural and educational programming are vital to keep them connected. JDC is proud to support this small, geographically isolated community care for its members, develop a new generation of leaders, strengthen its Jewish identity, and broaden its connections to the wider Jewish world.

EPJCC provides a central space for nearly 1,200 Jews in the city to come together, regardless of age, religious affinity or ethnic group, and serves as the hub for informal Jewish cultural and educational activities and Jewish life cycle events. EPJCC represents the future of this ancient and committed community, living peacefully in India for the past 2,000 years.

The JCC's activities include regular and special programs such as: festival celebrations; Hebrew lectures and Jewish lectures; Gan Katan - a Sunday School that provides Jewish enrichment for the community's youngsters; a Jewish youth group; weekend camps for all ages; Kol India – a Jewish community magazine; Rosh Hodesh programs; Bollywood workshops; holiday celebrations such as a Tu-Bishvat Seder, Purim parties and Yom Ha'atzmaut events; and young leadership events for young Jewish professionals.

A resurgence is underway as young local Jews are increasingly viewing India as a place to build their future, motivated by family ties, the flourishing community, and the country's recent economic growth. JDC is there, as it has been since 1961, when it first began supporting food programs for Jewish schoolchildren.
